A Career Filled with Discovery: Liz Biagioli

Liz Biagioli began her career in 2003 at WCS, first as classroom teacher, and eventually, a Discovery teacher. Discovery class is a weekly class focused on nature and the environment. As someone who has "seen it all," we asked Liz to reflect on the ways WCS has grown over the last 20 years.

What are the biggest changes you've seen at WCS over the years?



The direction it is taking at meeting the whole person as they arrive and supporting the whole individual while building relationships. The foundation of this experience that we have at Wissahickon is built on relationships... The foundation of community here is so valuable. And everyone who engages with our school is part of that community.

What is the thing you are most proud of accomplishing at WCS?

I am most proud of developing our Forest School at the Awbury campus. We are taking student learning outdoors for that total hands on learning experience. When I've asked students over the last few weeks what they are most excited about, the kids respond that they are excited to do further investigations about insects that they find in the soil, or hearing the wind blow through the leaves, or to have time in their sit-spots. It makes me feel like we are doing great work.

In your opinion, what message about nature is most essential for children to learn?

It's essential to life itself. There is so much scientific study about the benefits of time in nature to humans and how that can enrich our lives. It affects everything from health and wellness to our ability to learn. We're trying to cultivate that sense of peace that nature brings to our kids.
